Dear friends

As I write we are in lockdown 3 – and in the weeks ahead covered by this magazine, we will reach the once unthinkable milestone of a year since that first lockdown. I am mindful of how little we have been able to predict anything over this year. And it feels in some ways as if we are caught in a sort of Groundhog Day experience, facing recurrent loss of the ordinary and precious, and anxiety about - and fear of the consequences of - opening up our lives again.

In these winter days, lockdown feels especially hard – and the rising tide of death which we hear about on our news each day feels inexorable... but it seems that tide may be about to turn – even if slowly – and our region appears to be progressing well in delivering the vaccine too.. There is, genuinely, light ahead.. light in the darkness... appropriate as we celebrate Candlemas, when we celebrate Christ's recognition by Simeon as a light in the darkness of the world – and traditionally, also bless all the candles we will use in the year ahead.

RAF Air Cadets Anniversary Challenge



February 5th marks 80 years since the RAF Air Cadets was formed. Squadrons were set up in as many towns around the UK as possible, including Wideopen 861 Squadron. Local people ran them. During World War II, with many instructors being drafted into the RAF and squadron buildings being used by the military, cadets were sent to work on RAF stations. They carried messages, handled aircraft and moved equipment. They filled thousands of sandbags and loaded miles of belts of ammunition. They were invaluable.


Desert
